"Filthy Rich" Ecclesiastes 5:8 - 20



The Lord's Day & Monday

This week we will be studying Ecclesiastes 5:8-20.

This is a passage filled with serious warnings for us. All people, but especially Americans, need to consider very carefully what the Lord Jesus says to us here, through Solomon.

Our country is obsessed with making money and buying bigger and better stuff. I can't help thinking of rappers that produce albums and then movies with titles like "Get Rich or Die Tryin'." They have led many, many young men and women down a dark, dangerous path where they will "die tryin'." The sad reality is the album should be called, "Get Rich **and** Die Tryin'," because even if you do stack up piles of cash, you will die and face the God you have ignored.

But listen, boys and girls, a sinful love of money and dependence on money isn't just a problem for the hip-hop culture. The seeds of that sin are hidden in your heart and if you don't destroy it, it will destroy you.

The Bible gives us many clear warnings. Remember this guy?

But God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you, and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' **So is the one who lays up treasure for himself and is not rich toward God."** Luke 12:20-21



Last week's study ended with the words, "Fear God." I pray that you don't take what God says to us this week lightly. You should experience some fear when you think about the possibility of being destroyed by your money. Run to Jesus. He will save you. Be rich towards Him.

A godly man, first of all does not hoard his money. He uses it to benefit his church, his family, and those in need. He uses it to feed and clothe his family. He buys just enough, not too much and not too little, of everything he needs to stay physically and spiritually strong and healthy.

Most of all, the godly man does these things with extreme joy because he realizes and admits that God has given all of these things to him. He enjoys a good bowl of chili or some tacos not just because they taste good, but because he knows he has been blessed by his Father with them. He has been given good things that he does not deserve. He is being strengthened to serve his God for another day. He is "tickled pink" to think that God allows him, a Hell-deserving sinner, to have strength to work and to receive a paycheck and to buy things he needs.

These things and this attitude are gifts from God to be received with thanksgiving.

Lastly, the man who does not hold his money tightly, but does the things I mentioned above will not lament that his money is quickly gone. He will have joy that God and other people are being served. He will not worry about his money, like the rich man does. He will be too busy enjoying the good things that God allows him to do with it.

Tuesday

Today's reading is Ecclesiastes 5:8-9.

Have you ever thought about why it is so tempting to try to get rich?

One reason is that it seems that all the people with money also have all the power. Furthermore, for some reason, we are surprised that some do not use their power for good. Some that are rich abuse the poor. In response, some of the poor develop a sinful desire for revenge. They think, "If only I were rich, I would punish the people that are wronging me and I would help all of the poor people." Some of that sounds good, doesn't it? Unfortunately, that kind of desire is usually stained with sinful hatred and soon the desire to get rich controls the person instead of the person controlling the desire. Very often if a person succeeds in getting rich, they forget about their noble crusade to help the poor and they become (or it is revealed that they always were) the very thing they hated. In the book, <u>The Count of Monte Cristo</u>, a man gave this advice, "Hatred is blind, rage carries you away; and he who pours out vengeance runs the risk of tasting a bitter draught (drink)."

Thankfully, Solomon builds some fences to keep us from going down that road. He tries to lessen our outrage at injustice by telling us not to be surprised by it. Don't be shocked when sinful men do sinful things. He tells us that the rich and powerful try very hard to protect themselves and keep their money and power. They watch out for each other. The king gets fat on his throne from the food that the farmer busted his back to grow. This is nothing new. Your angry revenge isn't going to do much to change things, but remember that there is One who is more rich and more powerful than them all and He is watching very closely.

Another reason why we may be tempted to become rich is because we think that we are worthless and without value if we are poor. You want to "be somebody." Well, Solomon gives us some things to correct our thoughts there as well. First of all, we must humbly admit that we are "under God." He is the "highest official." We should realize that even if we are the greatest of all men we are nothing compared to God and His Son. Secondly, the "lowly" farmer supports the "great" king, the "great" warrior, and the "great" scholar with the food that he grows. God has given you your "lot in life" and it is a good one. Do not despise it.

Thursday

Today you should read Ecclesiastes 5:13 - 17.

We continue to look at the vanity of riches and the first thing we see today is that when you hoard money you are hurting yourself. How does it hurt you? We already saw yesterday that people will use you and will envy you. When you are in trouble, they will not defend and help you very quickly. They might even be happy that you are being cut down to size. Additionally, an abundance of riches can make us nervous and worrisome.

More importantly though, hoarding money hurts you by:

- 1. Making you proud.
- 2. Making you feel safe as though there is no physical or spiritual danger to be aware of.
- Making you love this world more and more. 3.
- Drawing your heart away from God. 4.
- 5. Making it difficult for you to enter into the kingdom of heaven.

Not only does hoarding money hurt you, it also is a very foolish thing to do.

First of all, something may happen which causes you to lose all of your money. Think about what happened to Job. Think about all the people who lost money at the start of the Great Depression. "Will you set your eyes on that which is not? For riches certainly make themselves wings; They fly away like an eagle toward heaven." (Proverbs 23:5)

Secondly, even if you do hold onto your money for your entire life, death will loosen your grip. Paul reminds us, "For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out." (1 Timothy 6:7) Solomon reminds us, "As he came from his mother's womb, naked shall he return, To go as he came...just exactly as he came, so shall he go." You came into this world butt naked and one day you will appear before God uncovered if you die without Jesus. You were born a sinner unworthy to stand in God's presence. If you spend all of your time stacking cash instead of seeking God, you will stand before God with your sins unforgiven. You will be naked and ashamed as he turns you from His presence to think about your useless money forever.

Wednesday

The reading for today is Ecclesiastes 5:10-12.

Today, Solomon explains the vanity of money and riches.

First, he explains that a man who loves money will always want more money. He will never have enough to be happy. A sinful desire or lust can never be satisfied. A person can be hypnotized and carried along by their lust for more money. Scripture gives us two warnings to snap us out of it.

Hell and destruction are never full; so the eyes of man are never satisfied.

-Proverbs 27:20

There are three things that are never satisfied, yea, four things say not, It is enough: The grave; and the barren womb; the earth that is not filled with water; and the fire that saith not, It is enough.—Proverbs 30:15-16

You can keep chasing after money, power, women, or whatever, but you will never be satisfied and finally you will meet two other things that are never satisfied: death and Hell.

Solomon also tells us that the quicker the money pours into your bank account, the quicker it pours out. Think about it. If you get rich and buy a huge mansion, who is going to clean the 20 bathrooms? Think about how much toilet paper you have to buy. Who is going to oil your bowling alley and dust your movie screen? You are going to have to hire a lot of people and that costs a lot of money. Not only that, whenever people want to "hang out" they are going to come to your house and make you buy all the pizza. When they are short on money who are they going to ask to borrow some from? People you don't even know will pretend to be your uncle or your long lost twin that you never knew about, just so they can get some of your money. My dad told me over and over again, "Possessions possess." In other words, you don't own them. They own you.

Finally, Solomon warns us that the rich have trouble sleeping. They lay awake worrying that someone will break into their mansion or steal their Ferrari. They worry that some disaster will happen and that they will lose their money. The hard-working man who has very little, on the other hand, sleeps well. He is not worried about losing things. He doesn't have much anyway and he is exhausted from work.
